Your Path, God's Purpose
Facilitator and Guide: Dan Coughlin
Room 18/20 Sundays starting January 12—February 16

This is a 6-session course on your interior life, your spiritual life, where your mind, heart, and soul come together. This course will require real work. The work is in the form of reflection, discussion, discernment, and decision. The guidelines will be respectfulness, open-mindedness, and caring. This is NOT a lecture series. This IS a discussion series. Each session will consist of brief explanations of a few ideas followed by personal reflection and interpersonal discussion. There will be an Action Guide provided to the attendees at each session.

We will begin in Session 1 with an exercise on clarifying what you think God's purpose is for your life right now. We will discuss all the benefits to other people and to yourself when you are successful in fulfilling God's purpose for you. Throughout the course, we will focus on you working to understand yourself better, and applying your understanding of yourself to fulfilling God's purpose for you. We will focus on how you can apply your character strengths, values, morals, passions, talents, and sources of self-confidence toward the fulfillment of what you believe to be God's purpose for your life.

In addition, we will focus on communicating with empathy, which means to work to understand what another person is thinking and feeling, and then responding in an appropriate way. We will also discuss how to provide effective leadership and build effective teamwork and apply it toward the fulfillment of God's purpose for small groups of people. Teamwork means to support one another toward the fulfillment of a meaningful purpose and the achievement of important objectives.

Doughnuts & Coffee by Margie Kohl

Have you ever wondered if that money that you throw in the basket on Sunday actually covers the cost of the doughnuts and coffee that you enjoy? The answer is no, it does not. Every week our intake of money is less than our costs for providing the delicious doughnuts and Fair Trade Coffee that we serve. Our reminder sign has said \$1.00 donation suggested for years, but prices rise. So, those signs will say \$2.00 in 2020. Nobody is watching what you put in, but just know that the price of a doughnut is slightly over \$1 a piece, and that doesn't include the coffee that is served. There is no Doughnut/Coffee Hour fund, so when we are short, it gets taken out of the General Fund. But if you eat and drink it, shouldn't you feel some responsibility to pay for it? How much do you pay at Starbucks or Krispy Kreme? Can you afford \$2.00? When your group uses the coffee we provide in the kitchen, think about passing around a collection plate to offset the cost. When you use the supplies in the kitchen, think about those costs--we don't have a line item for napkins or plates, either.

January Benevolence: Unleashing Potential

Recently, Neighborhood Houses changed its name to Unleashing Potential (UP). Although the name has changed, the mission is the same as it was when UP started as part of the Settlement House Movement in 1913: To provide children and families the support they need to grow UP, keep UP, reach UP leading to a more just community for all.

Unleashing Potential's programs include Early Childhood Education, After School Programs, and Youth Enrichment Camps. Through these programs Unleashing Potential partners with parents and engage children to close the opportunity gap faced by children in lower income communities.

UP at Caroline Mission uses an evidence-based curriculum taught by dedicated and nurturing teachers. The staff at Caroline Mission works hard to provide high quality programming to ensure that children are equipped to enter kindergarten emotionally, socially and cognitively ready for learning.

UP After School is a safe and educational option for busy parents and is an extension to a child's classroom learning. UP After Schools provides an evidence-based curriculum approach to math, literature, character education, fitness and nutrition. High quality enrichment activities expose children to cultural arts and encourage creative expression in a supportive environment.

Up Enrichment Camps are located a various partner sites in St. Louis City and County to ensure that parents have affordable and safe options for their children during the summer months.

The Strength of Diversity shared by The Diversity Team

As a rule, human beings do not like diversity. We like for things to be the same, to be homogenous. There are several reasons for this, but perhaps the main reason for this is that diversity is hard.

Diversity is hard because it forces us to love the different. White people don't understand black people. Black people don't understand whites. The poor think differently than the rich, and the rich see things differently than the poor. The same is true of educated and uneducated, old and young, male and female...

But diversity is something God has built into the body of Christ. 1 Corinthians 12 speaks of the diversity of miraculous spiritual gifts God placed into the body, but there are certain natural gifts that are mentioned in other parallel texts about the body (Rom 12; Eph 4). These natural gifts are spread throughout the diversity (age, race, education, etc.) we have in the body of Christ.

It is for this reason that we must resist the temptation to gravitate to people just like us. It's easier to relate with people just like ourselves, but if we only go to churches that are homogeneous or if we only visit with people in church that are the same age, education, race, economic level as we are, then we are robbing ourselves of one of the great strengths God has blessed us within the body.

Celebrating the History & Missions of St. Lucas UCC by Joy Dressel

St. Lucas will turn 140 years old in 2020! St. Lucas was born into the extended family of the **German Evangelical Synod of North America**, which had been organized forty years earlier at our very own mother church, **St. Johns in Mehlville**. The first pastor at St. Johns was the Rev. Louis Nollau, who had come to the U.S. from Prussia, intending to do mission work with Native Americans in the Northwest. When his original plans fell through, Nollau put his energies into pastoring German immigrants in St. Louis County. In 1840 Nollau organized the church society that became the German Evangelical Synod and, in 1850, was involved in the establishment of what is now **Eden Theological Seminary**. Nollau spearheaded the establishment of the **Good Samaritan Hospital** in 1856 and, in 1858, the orphanage that we now know as **Every Child's Hope**.

Eleven years after Nollau's death, one of his sons assisted with the birth of our St. Lucas congregation as he became a charter member. The people of St. Lucas and the rest of the German Evangelical Synod continued to be inspired by Matthew 25:31-46 ("...I was hungry and you gave me food, ...truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me..."). They continued to create organizations to care for people in need. In 1889, in St. Lucas' early years, the Evangelical Deaconess Society of St. Louis was established and the first Deaconess Sisters started caring for the sick. This led to the creation of **Deaconess Hospital** and School of Nursing and Parish Nurse Ministries. Today the Deaconess Foundation focuses on the well-being of children in the Greater St. Louis Area. In 1893, in St. Lucas's second decade, people of the Evangelical Synod repurposed the Synod's vacated seminary campus in Marthasville, MO, and established the **Emmaus Home**, where they could respectfully serve individuals with epilepsy and developmental disabilities. Two years later, the German Evangelical Synod established an orphanage in Illinois, now known as Hoyleton Youth and Family Services. In 1913 a group of Eden Seminary students was essential in creating an organization to serve people living in poverty in a deteriorating area in the near south side of St. Louis. After many changes over the years, that center grew to become Caroline Mission of the Neighborhood Houses organization, which has rebranded itself as **Unleashing Potential**. It now focuses on caring for and educating low-income children and teen mothers.

What a foundation of family partnerships we have from the first three decades of the life of the St. Lucas congregation! During our years as part of the United Church of Christ family we have supported these organizations and have established more partner organizations, including **Lydia's House**, **Cape Albeon** and the **Institute of Family Medicine**. Our denominational partners provide a wide variety of ways for the people of the church to act as the hands and feet of Christ in the St. Louis area.

Expect to hear later about an opportunity to help children in foster care by donating used luggage and duffel bags as we celebrate the history and missions of our church.

Council Corner Update for December 19, 2019

To the St. Lucas Congregation!

Negotiations with Reverend Doctor William Smutz (pronounced Smootz) have been successfully completed. Reverend Dr. Smutz will begin serving St. Lucas as an Intentional Interim Senior Minister on February 1, 2020. He is currently serving as Intentional Interim Senior Minister at First Congregational Church.

Our St Lucas search committee, formed earlier this summer, conducted a diligent search for an exceptional candidate Intentional Interim Minister to serve St. Lucas. Reverend Doctor Smutz was selected as the obvious best candidate after months of planning, searching, and interviewing.

Your Council has taken time to become familiar with Reverend Doctor Smutz. At a special meeting of the Council, we voted unanimously to approve the Call Agreement and offer the position to him. The Call Agreement defines an initial one year of service to St. Lucas, with two additional six month extension options. Reverend Dr. Smutz has accepted this offer from St. Lucas and this week has taken the appropriate steps to inform First Congregational of his decision to leave their service shortly.

Prior to February 1, 2020, Pastor Anna has agreed to continue to assist Pastor Kelly to serve St. Lucas in the exemplary manner to which we have all become accustomed. Thank you, Pastor Anna.

I ask that you all welcome Reverend Dr. Smutz to our St. Lucas family with open arms. He is an exceptional person with a deep desire to restore stability and hope to the St. Lucas family. I believe he is the right person to lead us in the tasks facing our congregation in 2020, and beyond.
